LIST OF ACCEPTABLE AND PROHIBITED MATERIALS

ACCEPTABLE WASTE:

<u>INERT WASTE</u> – defined as waste that is solid and, on disposal in a landfill, is not reasonably expected to undergo physical, chemical, or biological changes to such an extent as to produce substances that may cause an adverse effect.

It includes but is not limited to:

- ✓ Demolition debris, concrete, asphalt, glass, ceramic materials
- ✓ Scrap metal, dry timber/wood (not chemically treated)
- √ Furniture
- ✓ Waste material from building or construction sites
- ✓ Non-hazardous, non-putrescible (general), commercial, industrial, or household solid waste
- ✓ Inert demolition materials (wood, concrete, rubble) and/or up to Industrial Class III inert solids as defined in the Environmental Protection and Enhancement At Waste Control Regulation (AR 192/96)

UNACCEPTABLE WASTE:

MSW – MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE – generally acceptable MSW includes:

- ⊗ Residential kitchen waste
- ⊗ Residential yard/garden waste
- ⊗ Non-hazardous, non-liquid, putrescible wastes

⊗ PROHIBITED WASTE MATERIALS:

- Hazardous waste/Waste containing free liquid and/or certain putrescible wastes
- Unacceptable putrescible wastes are decomposing organic matter such as medical, biological or pathological wastes as defined in the Waste Control Regulation (AR 192/96)
- ⊗ Solid mixtures with a flash point of less than 61°C
- ⊗ Hydrocarbon contaminated materials
- ⊗ Cleaning agents and solvents (ketones, alcohols, acids (pH<2) and Corrosive solids (bleach, etc.)
- ⊗ PCB materials
- ⊗ Explosive materials & cylinders of flammable, poisonous or corrosive gasses (except for propane tanks, fire extinguishers, etc. these may be accepted for recycling)
- ⊗ Flammable solids and/or spontaneously combustible materials
- ⊗ Organic peroxide and poisonous/infectious solids
- ⊗ Radioactive materials
- Liquid waste solids, including but not limited to waste oil, free liquids, etc.
